

Thank you to Scott Wolff who spoke to neighbors on Park Point birds and preventing bird strikes at the April meeting.

The Park Point Rummage Sale Extravaganza was created to maximize the focus on the Park Point Art Fair which is the main fundraiser for the Community Club. The revenues from the fair fund the Summer Youth Program, environmental initiatives and community activities which match the Club's mission. Would you be willing to have rummage sales on the designated rummage weekend and not on June 29 & 30? Thank you for your support and consideration. Thank you to Dave Lavamaki for his work on the Rummage Sale again this year.

The City has pledged to repair the deplorable stretch of Lake Ave from the Bridge to the S-Curve and our hope is that project is wrapped up in time for the rummage sale. This need was presented to Alicia Kozlowski, City's Community Relations Officer and Chauncey Bangs, City's Senior Engineering Specialist, who came down to check in with neighbors at the April PPCC meeting. The cost of the milling off the top three inches of pavement and installation of new asphalt will be $\sim \$130,000$. The project is slated to start on May 29th. Thank you to Alicia and Chauncey for bringing that good news to the Park Point community! With the busy visitor's season soon upon us, roads in good repair and tidy and well supported parks send the message that Park Point is well kept and cared for; hopefully residents and guests will do their best to pick up, preserve and respect our extraordinary island.

I attended the Summer Youth Program on Thursday and met new excited campers for this year's program at Lafayette. Kevin and Karen are teaming up again for another awesome summer on Park Point for young Duluthians! Enthusiasm for the program was in the air as the new families signed up with Youth Program volunteers Rhonda Strum and Sally Buck. We are grateful for the recent repairs and upgrades at Lafayette.

The April 16, 2019 meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm by club vice president Tom Griggs. Seventeen people signed the attendance sheet.

Officer Nick Hudson, Duluth Police Department, asked if anyone had questions. All has been well in our area recently. Alicia Kozlowski, Community Relations, and Chauncey Bangs, City Engineer, each reported on the area between the lift bridge and 13th Street. Work will begin May 29 and should be completed by June 19, 2019. City is aware of rummage sale, residents, tourists and inconvenience. They will do their best to speed the project completion. City plans to maintain 2-way traffic. Noisy trucks will be hauling. No street parking. 11th Avenue will be open to traffic, as well as driveway entrances. City does not know what will be found below street as they remove asphalt. Will keep us advised.

SCOTT WOLFF PRESENTATION ON AVOIDING BIRD STRIKES

Scott has been birding for years and it is one of his main reasons for moving to Duluth. Bird strikes on windows account for millions of bird fatalities in the U.S. every year. A study conducted several years ago estimated that 2800 birds die from window strikes each year on Park Point alone. Large windows facing the lake are the biggest culprit. Scott showed several simple ways to reduce birds striking windows and has resources for many more options. The most important times to reduce reflection on our windows are during migration, mid- April Thru May and again mid -August thru September. Scott will talk with Dawn Buck about adding information to PPCC website.





Deer Ticks and Lyme's Disease

Before you go out to work or play outside, you'll want know more about those tricky ticks who will meet you at the door. At the May 13 potluck (Monday, 6 p.m.) Dr. Ben Clarke, Associate Professor in the Biomedical Sciences Department of the UMD Medical School, will talk about ticks. He has been dubbed "The Tick Warrior" because he and his students have been tracking and analyzing ticks—particularly deer ticks. Where they are the thickest, how likely they are to be carrying Lyme's disease, how to avoid them...will be addressed in this valuable presentation. Gardeners, photographers, hikers, yard maintainers and anyone venturing outside will profit from this tick talk. Please join Ben at the potluck. This could be a health-and life-saving event. Member or not, you are invited. Bring your own plate, cutlery and a dish to share. We welcome you.

The garden compost piles are heating up and needing your leaves and kitchen scraps (no meat or dairy). Just dump in the food scraps and cover it. Bags of leaves can be left inside the fence. When you stop at a coffee shop, please ask if they have used grounds to contribute to the garden. There are lots of black bags you can take to refill. They are in one of the towers by the gate.
