Sanitary Sewer Lining Continues



These have become familiar sights the last couple weeks – the Michels trucks disgorging men, equipment and hoses, and steam arising from manholes as the cured-in-place-pipe lining continues along Park Point, and will soon begin in Canal Park. They spent a couple days parked across from my house, with a request for reduced water usage. It meant skipping a couple showers, but, hey, we're not going out anywhere. And its good to see some people working.

And it's hardly the only project that's ongoing. The third and final stage of runway reconstruction at Sky Harbor Airport (actually stage 3B, as 3A was completed last Fall) will begin in mid-May, and run through mid-June. Besides ending a long conflict between runway approaches and the old-growth pine forest, it will conclude with environmental mitigation, the planting of native species, and construction of 5 more underwater cribs to improve fish habitat.

Another project that's actually benefiting from the pandemic shut-down is the Lake Avenue Bridge re-decking. Since they don't have to make allowances for Grandma's Marathon or other events, they can get right down to it, beginning the last week of April, with a goal of opening the bridge and the Superior Street intersection by the end of June. Improvements I am looking forward to are bike lanes across both sides of the bridge, and a left-turn lane onto Superior Street. These may not be exclusively Park Point issues, but they sure affect are comings and goings. And we will be coming and going again – sometime!

President's Report

Hi Neighbors,

The northeaster persists and it's a bit chilly when heading down to the beach to get in touch with the essentials of life. I have introduced the "no such things as bad weather, only inadequate clothing selections" concept to the grandkids and we are practicing on how to prepare for outings along the big lake. Wool, layering, windblock and space are essentials for pandemic life on Park Point.

With the little kids sheltering with us, we have not gotten to many of the indoor projects that time home from work would allow so we have shifted to what we can do outside. We finally built the firewood racks that we have talked about for several years. We don't head to town much, a few strategically planned trips to Menards & the grocery store. During a recent trip to pick up a few things for a fencing project (putting up the fence for the big dog that we weren't going to get...aka Bruno), Jocko at the building materials desk at Menards said that they had actually run out of drywall two times since the stay at home order began. I am happy to hear that neighbors are getting their long awaited drywall projects done! Drywall work is one dusty project that I might be tempted to put off forever....

Members of the Erosion and High Water Committee, chaired by Hamilton Smith, are participating in the monthly conference calls with the US Army Corps of Engineers Duluth Harbor Dredged Material Management Working Group. Jim Luke from the Corps is the Outreach Coordinator. Stay tuned for the latest on how and exactly when beach nourishment will start from the Bridge to the S-curve. Contracts have been awarded and the start date is in August 2020. We have not heard if the sand will be pumped over the street or if the sand will be barged in or ?? If they can't distribute sand all the way to 12th, they will resume next summer. Interstate Island will be nourished in October. Since October has become the new November in terms of gale force winds and storm surges, getting that sand in place before October will be important. Efficient and effective collaboration between agencies and the City will be necessary to meet ongoing challenges. Thank you to everyone who has participated in the process leading to this action to protect the beach, one of the City's greatest treasures. By the number of people I am seeing out on the beach on a daily basis, even at sunrise, the beach is more beloved than ever!

If you would like to check out a cool video shot on Park Point, see "Uncertain Certainties" by Josh Peterson. Filming takes place in the graffitied remains of the U.S. Lighthouse Station Depot, south of the old lighthouse near the end of Park Point. The depot was used to store buoys and acetylene used in the batteries that powered the lighthouse on the piers along the ship canal. The building was used from 1905 to WWII. The storage of acetylene too close to the canal and aerial bridge was not a good idea (Ka- Boom) so was stored in this structure. What's New(s)?

In this age of physical distancing we still enjoy social interaction in our community garden, albeit in smaller groups than in the past. It's a great way to get some sunshine and exercise while relieving the stress of being homebound.

We need your leaves:

WLSSD is open again, but if you don't want to travel that far with yard waste, keep it on Park Point. Just set the bags inside the gate or dump the leaves (not the bags) into the compost bins along the fence on the lake-side of the garden.


Burning Wood on Park Point
