

#### **News from the Lafayette Community Edible Garden**

September was a sad month for the community gardeners as we wished founding member LeAne Rutherford farewell as she moves to California. We honored her with a table full of desserts-to-die-for at the September potluck dinner meeting. Also at that meeting, Nicolette Slagle joined us to share her adventures in growing hemp locally. As a licensed hemp grower, she is learning the ins and outs of producing strains that meet the THC levels appropriate for preparing hemp products, such as salves, for the retail market. Nicolette's presentation was eye-opening and very informative for gardeners and all who have pains that could be remedied by hemp CBD products. At our October 14 potluck dinner meeting, ex-Duluthian Liz Wilson will be our speaker. In 1999, Liz met a young couple starting a CSA farm in Essex-on-Lake Champlain, New York. She became their first volunteer. Essex Farm has since grown into an enormous operation. Liz learned that her interests and skills did not lie in farming itself. Her early volunteering involved cleaning glassware, and moved through taking care of horses, and finally settled into being the chef for Friday noon meals for all the farmers. Wilson's talk will try to give you a sense of this kind of farm operation and its relationship to the local, small community; how it interacted with older and more established farmers; and how it inspired a generation of young new farmers.


Nancy and John Sedgwick received the 8<sup>th</sup> District Beautification Award for individual gardens and


