After obtaining permission to utilize the old hockey rink for a community garden from City Parks & Rec and the blessing of the PPCC, the original garden beds were built in 2009 from old hockey boards. Most of those are now rotting. A few additional beds were built the following year from scavenged materials from Playfront Park when it was demolished to make way for a new Playfront Park.

We feel that the LCEG has had a positive effect on our community--socially, educationally, and environmentally. It fits perfectly with the purpose of the club "to work for the betterment of the community and welfare of its residents." In addition, we expect it will be more attractive to look at and enjoy when rotting beds are replaced with the new metal ones. There are currently 30 active member families of the garden, all of whom work in the garden and enjoy the fruits of the garden. We donate produce to the Damiano Center Soup Kitchen and the CHUM food shelf where it is much appreciated. Gardeners also spend about an hour a week working with the PP kids program on some aspect of gardening and healthy eating as well as having fun building scarecrow caretakers for the garden.
