Hoping this note finds you well, wearing a mask and thinking about how we all affect each other's lives every day, whether we like it or not. This fall, the turkey was petite, the gatherings smaller and eye strain from Zoom meetings and online life more profound. Despite the challenges of the current human condition, joy can be found and that's a really good thing. We met a young visitor from Pennsylvania on the beach this morning who was entranced with the beauty and splendor of our daily backdrop; his joy sparked a surge of gratitude for our extraordinary lives on Park Point. He liked our wagging little group of dogs, too.

A note of sincere gratitude for the neighbors who worked at Lafayette polling place on November 3rd. Deb Strange led a crew of newer election judges who had a long day of facilitating our democratic process. Thank you for providing a smooth and safe process for our engaged community during this global pandemic.

Our annual January Membership pizza party has been postponed and instead, mark your calendars for Tuesday, January 19th at 5:30pm, when Mike Tusken of the Duluth Police Department will check in with Park Pointers on improving safety in our community. The annual membership fee of ten dollars helps pay for The Breeze, the only community newsletter in Duluth that is delivered to each home, organization & business by neighborhood volunteers. Contact the Vice President, Tom Griggs, if you would like to join or have questions. A membership form will be in The Breeze and on the website, parkpointcommunityclub.org. Club elections will take place in May; contact members of the executive board if you are interested in a community volunteer position with the PPCC.

The Exec. Board hosted the second PPCC Zoom meeting on the 17th. Again, thanks for working through the delays and glitches that accompany these virtual platforms. City Councilor Arik Forsman joined the meeting to check in with us and hear what is on neighbors' minds.

We heard from a neighbor near 11th about post beach restoration observations: shredded aluminum cans, small shards of aluminum, clay like material, oily deposits. Four Erosion and High Water committee members and a representative from the USACE walked the area with the neighbor on 11/19 to see what was on the beach and see if the debris is an unintentional consequence of the project. (If you have not been following the project, the City of Duluth requested that dredged material from the USACE be used to nourish the Minnesota Point shoreline in 2020 to temporarily restore eroded beach and dune habitat. The beach in the stretch was previously restored using dredged materials in 1962 and 1996.) City leaders and the USACE are aware of the concerns raised, have seen the materials collected and are taking a serious look at the issues identified.

A few questions I was thinking about after hearing the concerns raised at the meeting:

- How can beach restoration processes using dredged materials on Lake Superior shores be improved? What are the other options, who is responsible for the development and who will pay for them? What data will be needed/helpful to develop long term management strategies?
- How much of this sharp aluminum is there and will more be uncovered after storm surges? How to get this material off of the beach? Signage to warn beach goers?
- Where exactly did the cans come from? Evidence/ timeline suggests that it came along unintentionally with the dredgings added to the beach. How else could it have arrived?

Who is responsible and now what??

A community clean effort up may be in order if the shredded cans and shards continue to reappear after lake surges. When you are down in that area of the neighborhood (canal to 18th), would you be willing to pick up beach trash and report back (with photos if possible) of where you are finding debris & what kind of trash is going in your bucket or bag? Be careful with the sharp items; gloves are a good idea. Thank you for your continued stewardship of the park. Another neighbor at the meeting reported that a successful rain garden at 19th is reducing the amount of sump pump discharge into the street. Water flowing into the street and infrastructure questions have been another area of focus for the EHWC.

The Erosion & High Water Committee volunteers will be asking questions, seeking answers and will continue collaborating with city officials, USACE, relevant agencies, scientists, stakeholders, and legislators. Chairperson Hamilton Smith is at 218-343-2600 if you have questions or are seeking information on what the committee has learned.

We are grateful for neighbors and visitors who care deeply about the shores and waters of Lake Superior, sources of joy and awe for everyone.

#### News from the Erosion and High Water Committee

As stated in the Nov. Issue of the Breeze, the EHWC was asked by, the City of Duluth and the USACE, to reach out to the residents of Park Point whose property was adjacent to the areas where the 2020 Beach Nourishment occurred and the proposed 2021 B N is planned. Three members of our committee distributed letters to the two different area of concern asking for their feedback. That info has been sent back to the City of Duluth and the USACE. Thirteen people from eleven different households responded. While most were positive, there were some that raised a few issues that our committee is planning to address.

Four members of our committee joined resident Jan Karon, and Corey Westin from the USACE, to inspect the beach from the Bridge to about 15th ST. To see for ourselves some of the concerns raised. Paul Treuer wrote a full report explaining what we observed. That report is available on the PPCC website.

Paul and I each took, individually, a walk to the south end of the point. That is an area where B N was done in 2019. We were looking specifically for the same signs of those issue raised by some residents close to the 2020 B N project. Thankfully we saw no evidence of those issue in the 2019 project area.

On my tour of the Point, I was specifically observing those area where last year there were considerable areas of standing water at the curb where the storm sewer drainage occurs. There seems to be much less this year than last year. The City had a crew down on the Point this Summer trying to address this issue. I observed them working on the 16th St. Street end where the Bus shelter is. Filling in some low area and making the drainage work away from the Bus stop. Seems much better this year.

Our committee is investigating some long-term solution to the erosion and high water issues. Those long term solutions are more complicated and expensive but need to be explored.

Hamilton Smith wrote an article for the Nov 2020 issue of the Breeze concerning the Beach Nourishment program that began this past summer. Gale Kerns reiterated what took place. He addressed several concerns about the project.

#### News from the Lafayette Community Edible Garden

Ellie Alspach recently surveyed the 2020 community garden participants to determine how successful our garden experience was and what we liked best this past year. Here are some of the outcomes: We owe Ellie and Ted Buck a big thank you for the many plants they started indoors last spring and transplanted into the garden; Through Ted's University of Minnesota Extension basil seed trail we discovered an Asian basil that was unusual and delicious; Kale was not only popular, but also the last edible plant standing in the garden; Cucumbers, carrots and beets all need to be thinned better to produce a larger yield; And, everyone loved the banana-shaped Federle tomatoes, the yellow-fleshed kuri squash, and the heirloom Fairytale French pie pumpkins, all items that are hard to find in our local grocery stores. The gardens have been put to bed by planting them with winter rye to help protect the soil, deter weeds, and form a green manure come spring.

Many of us look for ways to continue to enjoy our crops after our gardens are shut down. Some folks preserve, can and dehydrate, while others share their bounty, such as Charlene Shimmin and Don Lemmerman. In their home garden, they grew 146 spaghetti squash, many of which they gave away to other Park Pointers. Each squash has its own personality and Don found a way to embellish that by giving them their own identities. He probably named each one, too.

This past season, we missed seeing some of our members whose names are on our rosters. If you no longer wish to participate in our community garden, please contact Coral and let her know.
