
President's Report

Hi Neighbors,

Thanks to everyone who has joined the Club this year & a special shout out to neighbors who donated a bit extra for 2021. The 50th Park Point Art Fair is set for June 25,26 2022; mark your calendars for this signature event and the club's major source of financial resources.

I have seen the efforts of the Neighborhood Watch and Traffic Safety Initiative working to calm the traffic- good work as the weather improves and the recreational mecca is alive with activities of all types. Thanks again to the DPD for support and guidance.

A few months back, Park Pointer, now Californian, LeAne Rutherford, sent a link to a story about the famous Duluth painter David Ericson who lived an impoverished life as a boy on Minnesota Point in the 1870's. Allegedly, his amputated leg was buried in the dunes by an early benefactor when he was eleven. The question came up of where on Park Point did David spend his early years? I had a call from a Park Pointer who reported that there is a cottage, 35th block, on the beach where the young painter lived. Recently I was on a walk with the grandkids and met the owner of the

cottage. The painter who had been renting the cottage around the time his grandparents bought the place was Knute Heldner. It is possible that the Ericson family rented there in earlier years. David Ericson left Duluth in 1887. Ericson and Heldner painted each other's portraits in 1931 in France; see both at the Tweed Museum of Art. Ericson moved back to Duluth in 1941 after his wife died. He stopped painting for a bit in his grief then was inspired to continue on and teach art classes, "Michelangelo and Titian both painted until they were about ninety. Death is the only retirement." Ericson was hit by a car in December of 1946, 12th Ave. E. and Superior St. near his home, and died ten days later at age 77. http://zenithcity.com/archive/people-biography/david-ericson/ I am still looking for information about the Park Point Ericson family in the 1870's, give a call if you might have something to share. Never dull on Park Point!

News from The Erosion and High Water Committee

It has been a busy month for the EHWC even though we didn't have an official committee meeting. The City of Duluth had two press conferences concerning the Park Point beach. The first one was to announce the placement of warning signs at beach access points in and around the 2020 Beach Nourishment area. These signs gave warning to people walking the beach of the potential hazard of metal shards on the beach. These signs were first recommended by the EHWC with the approval of the PPCC.

The second press conference was to outline the USACE's plan to survey the 2020 Beach Nourishment area and the plan to clean-up the debris deposited during that project. By the time you read this article the survey should be started or completed with to clean-up soon to follow.

The City of Duluth hosted a public meeting with the USACE, the MPCA and DR. Gary Glass giving presentation. Information was brought forth about the clean-up, the proposed 2021 Beach Nourishment project and other issues pertaining to Beach Nourishment. The meeting was well attended. Between the two platforms, Facebook and Webex, there were about 70 people in attendance. A link to that meeting video, along with other relevant links, can be found on the PPCC website.

The City of Duluth and the USACE are moving forward with plans for the 2021 Beach Nourishment project starting late July or Early August. The material being dredged this year contains considerably less fine organic material than the material place last year. It is this organic material that, when exposed to the oxygen in the air, gives off the temporary smell and surface shine we witnessed last year. With the lower content these two irritants should be less prevalent this year.

Thanks to all who have collected, documented and delivered the metal debris from the beach. Hopefully the USACE's clean-up efforts will soon make that unnecessary. We will discontinue our recording during the survey and clean-up period. The amount of debris collected has decreased since the ice disappeared.

The EHWC will have a meeting on 5-11-2021. If you want to attend, please send me an email a day or two before the meeting and I will send you the link.



News from the Lafayette Community Edible Garden

Welcome new community garden member Rich Peterson. Rich, along with the other community gardeners, will be back to work in the garden in May. There's lots to do starting with turning over the rye grass planted as a cover crop in beds to serve as green manure, weeding, moving compost around, setting up trellises and harvesting rhubarb. After all that, we will start planting seeds and transplants.

Tips from our local seasoned "Pros:"

- -Don Lemmerman says, "Before working with your bare hands in the dirt, rub soap under your fingernails. It will be easier to get your hands clean when you wash them. Alternately, just wear garden gloves."
- -Ted Buck reminds us, "Carefully read the seed packets to plant for success. Make sure the seeds you choose are for the right climate and make sure they fit the parameters you seek for length of time it takes for the plants to mature. Seeds that take a long time to mature are best started indoors and then moved to the garden when the soil warms up."
- -Ellie Alspach suggests, "Try new things. For the 2021 garden, we will be adding award-wining heirloom Salvaterra roma tomatoes; black-eye peas, which are actually beans; and red-core Chantenay carrots. Of course, these will all be organic varieties."

Bring on the Compost:

We need to replenish our compost bins again, and that's where everyone can help. The compost bins are inside the community garden at Lafayette Square. Here are the guidelines: we accept kitchen food scraps that are produce - no meat or dairy; we accept leaves – no brush, weeds, needles or big plants. Please bag your donations and set them inside the garden gate. We will take care of the rest.

The Lafayette Community Garden is located at Lafayette Park, 3016 Minnesota Ave. on Park Point. Coral McDonnell is the contact person for folks interested in our community garden and potluck dinners. When we have them, our monthly potluck dinners are FREE and open to all Park Pointers. They take place at the Lafayette Community Club....when it is finally open for use again.
