Not Quite the Park Point Rummage Sale



The Park Point's Community Club's sponsorship of the Park Point Rummage sale has always been hinged to the Park Point Art Fair. It was originally started to discourage people from having sales on Art Fair weekend. And the costs involved, for advertising and additional porta-potties, were covered by income from the Art Fair. With the Art Fair pushed back yet another year, the Club decided to let the rummage sale slide again as well. However, if individuals wanted to have their own rummage sales, that was deemed safe enough.

So, when one Park Point resident offered to run an advertisement including the addresses of people who planned to have to have a sale, about 20 or so residents joined in. And all the other sales? Well, as the vaccines rolled out, and the pandemic began to recede, I guess people were just feeling safer. (It helped, no doubt, that at 74%, the Park Point neighborhood had the highest vaccination rate in the county). And Park Pointers had two years' worth of accumulated detritus to dispose of. For whatever reason, sales proliferated, and what we had was something that looked pretty much like the Park Point Rummage Sale.

There was plenty of pent-up demand, as people came out even on the first day of not-so-pleasant weather. (We always seem to have one good and one bad day, weather-wise. It helps when the bad day comes first, 'cause the die-hard rummage salers will come out in any weather). And as a mostly outdoor event, it was a way for people to kind of ease back into normal life. Even a couple food trucks got wind of the doings, and found places to set up. Next year, with the return of the Art Fair, the Community Club will no doubt sponsor an "official" rummage sale. But for this year, well, it worked.

Traffic Safety/Neighborhood Watch Update, Pat Sterner, parkpointtrafficsafety@gmail.com

All Park Pointers are welcome to sign up to work on the traffic safety initiative, contact Pat for information; equipment is on Pat's front porch, you could do vehicle counts for a half hour for useful data, record license plate numbers of speeders for the database of repeat offenders, having the data on the number of cars passing is helpful. Remember to call 911 when you see excessive speeding, passing or reckless driving, suspicious activities, or any crime in progress. Collect the license plate number if you possibly can. (Send the details of what you observed to parkpointtrafficsafety@gmail.com after calling 911.)

Neighborhood Watch: Campers in Southworth Marsh City Park, Deb Holman at CHUM was contacted and the DPD is aware of the situation. Questions came up about the closing time at the park at the end and about enforcement. City rentals of the Beach House go after 10pm, online guide shows rentals until 12:30am. Camping at the S-Curve Beach has also been noted this summer.

Sky Harbor Airport Updates: Manager Ken Timm told us a little about himself and the journey to his new position. He is looking forward to collaborating with the community and has some exciting ideas about welcoming community members to the public's airport~ stay tuned! Matthew Stewart described the master planning process for the airport and how Park Pointers and community members can be involved. News from The Erosion and High Water Committee

Our committee meet on 6-8-2021 at 1620 Minnesota Ave. We had five individuals from the greater Park Point community join us. The topic of discussion was planting of beach grass and dune restoration. It was decided that this was an appropriate undertaking for the EHWC to address. Our goal was to streamline the process of getting permits and permission to do a beach grass project and to educate any Park Point residents on the process and procedures for doing such projects. If you are interested, please come to our next meeting. We will not be meeting in July so look for our next meeting date in the Aug. Breeze.

An update on the Beach clean-up and the 2021 Beach Nourishment projects. Raking and digging in the 2020 Beach Nourishment area on land, has been completed. The debris sifted from those areas is being sorted and analyzed. We will get a report on those finding at a later date.

The in-water clean-up will take place in the beginning of Aug. The same contractor who will be doing the Beach Nourishment project will also be doing the in water clean -up in last year's Beach Nourishment area. This coordination of project will lessen the time the beach is being disrupted or closed.

The USACE has obtained a beach rake for their own use. They will be raking the beach from the pier to 10th St. once a month and after any large wind events. They will also be doing a one-time raking from 10th to 36th ST. This is planned to be completed before the 4th of July weekend. Future beach raking will be dependent on the amount and kind of debris collected.

PARK POINT TRAFFIC SAFETY REPORT

JUNE 23, 2021

Synopsis

There were a total of 32 NW Shifts completed from April 28 to June 23, with 20 PP Residents participating as NW Volunteers.

NW Watch Shifts reported an average of 200 and 250 cars passing north and south within a 50 minute period of time during their shifts, with increased volume on the weekends and sunny days.

The majority of cars were NOT speeding or were going between 35-40 mph. Those who appeared to exceed the 30 MPH speed limit slowed down when they saw NW Volunteers.

There were no confrontations reported during these shifts, as volunteers are focused on waving and holding signs reminding folks to slow down. Volunteers noted a decrease in the number of cars exceeding 30-35 MPH. Volunteers and PP residents have also noted an increased police presence, with several traffic stops being made in the last two weeks in particular.

Repeat Offenders (recorded by NW Volunteers/Residents):

Volunteers continue to record license plate numbers of those vehicles observed speeding, passing or engaged in other dangerous driving (such as using cell phones to text or call). License plate numbers are recorded in the Traffic Safety Database and shared with the DPD. There have been fewer repeat offenders recorded during the NW shifts; volunteers will continue to record and PP residents have been asked to note license plate numbers and send those to the Clearinghouse to include in the Database.

Any emails or reports that include pictures and/or specific detail of dangerous driving are forwarded to Lt. Chad Nagorski.

High Volume Times Correlated with Dangerous Driving

Volunteers and Residents continue to report that the most egregious driving occurs on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights between 9 and 10 pm, typically coming out of the Park towards the Bridge. This is when excessive speeding, drag racing, passing, and revved engines happens most frequently.

With that said, the increased police patrols and presence – coupled with visible traffic stops – will continue to get the word out to not speed on Park Point.

Additional Activities

The Park Point Community Club and the Duluth Police Department held a joint press conference on June 11 at City Hall to officially launch "Operation Slow Motion". Local TV stations and the Duluth News Tribune provided coverage and promoted the message about traffic safety on Park Point. This type of coverage will serve as a reminder to residents and visitors about the importance of traffic safety on the Point; hopefully we will be able to do a follow up later in the summer.
