The above photo, received from Dan O'Neill, show the Park Point Smelt Patrol being sworn in at City Hall, sometime in the late 1950"s. They were essentially deputized, given 5-pointed star badges, and assigned sections of the beach to patrol, for unruly behavior and other violations. Dan was able to identify a number of these men, including his father, John O'Neill, at the far right. Then there's Wally Medlin, 4th from left, Jerome Malone, number 7, Eugene Sabatour, number 9, Manly Grover, 10, and Jerry Royer, 11. Many of these are still well-known Park Point families. I'm hoping someone can identify the rest, maybe even provide some stories of the Beach Patrol and the heyday of smelting on Park Point.

Although it is well past its peak – as is the population of smelt – the tradition of smelting continues. And we can celebrate the little silver delicacies at the **Magic Smelt Parade**, on May 8th in Canal Park.

President's Report

Thank you for reading the Breeze and keeping up with the information that the PPCC committees are gathering & sharing. If you noticed activity on the bay at about 32nd on a very blustery yet sunny Saturday in late February, you were watching the students of two Wisconsin professors collecting bay sediments for a Geomorphology of St. Louis Harbor Research Project. On Feb. 26, 2022, Dr. Andrew Breckenridge (UWSuperior), Dr. Harry Jol (UW Eau Claire) and five UWS students used the 30th street access to snowmobile out to conduct measurements along Park Point to understand Geomorphology of the St. Louis Harbor. They are testing the hypothesis that there is a ridge and swale strandplain complex buried under the sediments in the St. Louis Harbor. This research builds on ground penetrating radar (GPR) studies done previously by Dr. Jol. Both studies contribute to a more precise understanding of how and when Minnesota and Wisconsin Points were formed. Dr. Breckenridge shared Geologic History of the Duluth Harbor (2016) providing excellent background information to this study. Paul Treuer of PPCC's MP50 and several volunteers hosted the researchers in lower Lafayette and learned more about their studies, and also warmed them up with hot beverages and Park Point hospitality:) MP50 will host a gathering of scientists, maybe this summer, to discuss their findings about erosion and flooding on Minnesota Point, stay tuned for this date. The Park Point Summer Youth Program (affectionately known as "Camp Lafayette") is returning in full-strength! MP 50 Minnesota Point Long-range Resiliency Planning

USACE Section 111 Charrette, March 10/11, 2022 Duluth, MN. 9:00 - 4:00 PM

Approximately 30 people participated in a 2-day, in-person meeting at the MPCA Paulucci Building Conference Room. Participants included representatives from USACE, City of Duluth (Parks), MPCA, DNR Coastal Program, UMD, UWS, Duluth Port Authority, Izaak Walton League, Coalition to Protect Lake Superior and PPCC (Paul Treuer MP50).



Goals: Initiate planning process for the Section 111 Study, Build project delivery team, Set expectations for a constructive approach to this study, Provide a foundation for subsequent iterations of the planning process.

Meeting Observations: Everyone had opportunity to speak and contribute; Agenda moved quickly; Agenda was at times highly technical; Scope of the Study is limited to the Lake Superior side of Minnesota Point; Key people from City, MPCA, Port Authority attended only part of the time; scientific evidence presented for revised theories on sediment flow and impact of breakwaters; Full erosion rate data (lake and bay sides) sent from DNR to USACE; Section 111 Study will take approximately 18-24 months to complete before actions can be taken. Diane Desotelle, our primary City representative announced she is leaving her position with the City on April 1, 2022.

Outcomes: USACE planning team will review meeting input and write a report that will be shared and critiqued by stakeholders. It is expected this will be available within a month.

Impressions: \$12.5 M is not enough to deal with all of the damage caused to Mn. Point; Section 111 Study does not address immediate danger of damage to homes and roads in the next storm; scope is too narrow to deal with flooding and damage to homes on the bayside in the event of another high lake water level storm. Other funding sources should be found for these problems.

Conclusion: The Section 111 Study is important because it addresses new evidence of the impact of shipping structures on Minnesota Point erosion on the lake side. Paul Treuer will share the USACE Section 111 Charrette report with MP50 and PPCC once it is available. MP50 will continue its activities as a learning community (multiple scientists offered to participate in an information event on their research this summer). MP50 will host a gathering of scientists to discuss their findings about erosion and flooding on Minnesota Point.



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News from Lafayette Community Edible Garden

On the first day of Spring, I shoveled a path across the tennis court and went to take a look around the garden. Most of the beds were still snow covered including the chive and walking onion bed in the corner near the garden sign. Chives are the earliest herb to poke through the ground in the spring and they are my favorite so I was hoping to see something other than snow. In addition to the corner location, there are some that continue to pop up in other areas and paths between some of the beds. Chives contain both choline and folate, which are linked to improving memory functions and studies show that adults who eat more foods with choline do better in cognitive tests. Chives are also capable of improving and enhancing sleep quality. I can't wait till I can cut some to top my scrambled eggs, cottage cheese, salads and more. Chive butter is an easy to make favorite. Just add several spoonfuls of freshly chopped chives into a stick of room temperature butter and mix well. Place the mixture on a piece of wax paper and form into a roll and chill until firm. When harvesting chives, use a clean sharp scissors and cut from the plant deep at the base. They continue to grow back throughout the season.

Ellie Alspach and Ted Buck and perhaps other gardeners will soon be preparing starter plants for the community garden. Ted tells me he got into doing starter plants when he and Dawn moved into her grandma's house on the lake side in 2018 where he found a 20-year-old pack of Italian bean seeds so he planted them as a houseplant! Enjoying the results, he started planting a large variety of seeds and grew them in sunny windows and with grow lights at night and sometimes in the sunny windows at Harbor City School where he teaches. We give a shoutout to Harbor City School students who often come to the garden in late May to volunteer doing various heavy lifting garden tasks such as moving woodchips to pathways, or soil to beds, or turn compost. We are grateful for their service and are happy that they have a good time doing it.

In case you haven't heard, the Duluth Community Garden Program has announced that tomatoes are the vegetable of the year and we will be planting at least 9 varieties.

Thank you for dropping of your kitchen scraps to the compost piles in the garden. Soon more leaves will be brought over as well as coffee grounds from Great Harvest to cover the food scraps. Please smash up your eggshells before putting them in the compost as they are slow to decompose. If you see Brooks Anderson tending the compost, wish him a happy birthday as he turned 89 on April 2.

We have missed the monthly gatherings so much. We planned to have a potluck supper on Monday, April 11 at Lafayette but the city is working on the building and the work may not be completed by April 11. But we lucked out and are able to have the April 11 potluck at St. Andrews by the Lake. 6 p.m. We are grateful. Hope to see you there.

If you have a tree service working on your property this spring and they make wood chips that you don't need, think about donating them to the garden to use in the paths between the beds.
