President's Report

I had a few emails on car prowls recently in the 33-35 blocks. Also, I had a report of a woman in a white Ford pulling fully into a driveway near 23rd, knocking on the door, saying she was "looking for a lady jeweler." Please get to know your neighbors and call 911 to report crimes or suspicious activity. In your vehicles, keep valuables out of sight and block the views into garages and sheds with curtains. Lock your cars, sheds, garages, homes and don't feel bad about calling 911. If possible, take photos of suspicious cars and call in suspicious behavior- see something, say something- it might be very helpful information. Install a security camera; there are a few relatively inexpensive and easy to use options, Ring, Blink etc. Pat Sterner is tracking hazardous driving reports and is working with Sgt. Ethan Roe. Neighbors near 37th sent me a video of unstable ice formations and little volcanoes spewing ice. Please mind your step and the wind while on the ice and ice formations; consider what lies beneath your boots while exploring and consider that the ice shelf might collapse. Another neighbor near the bridge sent me photos of what looks like oily grime on the beach and is wondering if it's from beach nourishment. Hamilton Smith from the Erosion and High Water Committee has contacted the City, the DNR and the USACE. Please see the update from MP50 in another section of The Breeze; thank you to the Park Pointers who attended the public meeting on the Section 111 study. Continuing education and engagement on the issues of erosion and flooding on our unique and vulnerable barrier island are essential. Please contact Paul Treuer if you would like to learn more on MP50 and the resources we are gathering.

Speaking of learning more, I stopped by the Duluth Maker Space in December to watch students of Dr. Evan Larson working on the red pine samples from WI & MN Points. From WDIO: "Students from both Fond du Lac Tribal and Community College and the University of Minnesota Duluth worked with their mentor Evan Larson, a professor from the University of Wisconsin-Platteville, to sand a collection of cross sections gathered from the stumps of long deadred pine trees that grew on both points. News from the Lafayette Community Edible Garden

At our Monday, January 9 monthly potluck dinner and program, Pat Farrell was our speaker. Recently retired, Pat was a geography professor at UMD. Pat is an area soil expert and this is the second time she has given us talks on the subject. This month, her talk was titled "All the Dirt on Soil".

Some of the highlights include this quote from Charles E. Kellogg, USDA Yearbook of Agriculture, 1938, "All life depends on soil. There can be no life without soil and no soil without life. They have evolved together." We are reminded that half of soil's volume is space: space for air, water, roots, large and small organisms. Soil is quite alive. In 1 cubic meter of soil, you will find 50,000 earthworms, 50,000 insects and mites, and 12 million roundworms. Thinking on a smaller scale, in 1 pea-size bit of soil, you will find 30,000 protozoa, 50,000 algae, 400,000 fungi, and billions of bacteria.

For further reading, she recommends the book Finding the Mother Tree (Discovering the Wisdom of the Forest), by Suzanne Simard.

MP50. Minnesota Point Long-range Resiliency Planning



MP50 Working Group: Public Webinar. A public zoom meeting was held Friday, January 13, 2023 from 10:00 - 11:30 AM CST with speakers making the following presentations:

- Julie McDonnell, Coastal Program Specialist, Mn. Lake Superior Coastal Program, Mn DNR, Strengthening Coastal Communities Resilience in the Great Lakes Region Challenge.
- The Association of State Floodplain Manager project will provide one year of technical assistance and training workshops to develop planning scenarios for Minnesota Point. The Duluth team was selected for 2023. The team includes Julie McDonnell, DNR, Kate Kubiak, City of Duluth Natural Resources, Paul Treuer, PPCC & MP50, Sam Lobby, Western Lake Superior Sanitary District, Adam Fulton, City of Duluth Planning & Economic Development, Tom Johnson, City of Duluth Engineer, John Swenson, UMD Professor of Earth & Environmental Sciences.
- Section 111 Study Update, Capt. Sam Briscoe, USACE Project Manager, Dr. James Selegean, Hydraulic Engineer, USACE, and John Love, Planning, USACE reported:
- USACE Team is in the process of contracting with a firm to develop a coastal model to inform the study. A draft feasibility report should be completed by early to mid- 2024.
- Jim Selegean presented on the previous Sect. 111 study conducted in 2001 and its shortcomings. He shared proposed study scope including conceptual sediment budget. The scope of the study is for the lake side of Minnesota and Wisconsin Points. The study will include: literature review, bluff recession and characterization, growth of accretion fillets, sediment yield and characterization, tributary inputs, sediment transport modeling, model validation, and dredging history. Presentation recording is available for anyone to view.
- FEMA Flood Map Update for Minnesota Point, Ceil Straus, State Floodplain Manager
- We are getting new St. Louis County flood maps which will include new coastal zone mapping. Public open house to review the new maps is 2/16/23 from 5-7 PM at Public Works Pike Lake Conference Room, 4787 Midway Road, Duluth. Presentation recording is available for anyone to view.
