News from the Lafayette Community Edible Garden

Do you like freshly harvested produce in the summer? How about fabulous communal meals once a month? Did you like digging in the sand or making mudpies when you were a child? If you said "yes" to one or all of those questions, then you might enjoy a membership in Park Point's Lafayette Community Edible Garden. The membership fee is \$25 per household and the benefits are many. You will be a working member and learn how to plant, care for and harvest fresh produce all summer long. You will be invited to bring a delicious dish to share at our monthly potluck dinners. (Charlene Shimmin thinks they offer the best food in town!) And, you can participate in our special committees and events. Gardening is a team sport and it's a great way to meet other Park Pointers in a congenial, cooperative atmosphere.

Coral McDonnell reports, "[It's a] boring time of year for the garden. Not a drop of snow in the garden and green winter rye looks to be thriving!"

The winter rye Coral refers to is a cover crop that is planted in the garden beds at the end of the growing season, after the beds have been cleared of the harvest and weeds. The purpose for doing this is multifold: the rye adds nutrients to the soil, it aerates the soil, and it keeps weeds at bay. It is a self-sufficient crop and it thrives in below-freezing temperatures. In the spring, it is simply tilled into the soil. Since winter rye is a cereal grain, it could also be harvested and used to make flour or used in beer or vodka production. Stop by the Lafayette Community Garden at Lafayette Square this winter and take a look at the pretty green lawns of winter rye growing the in the garden beds.

March is the month planning starts for the 2024 growing season. Our club's seed expert, Ellie Alspach, has the 2024 garden plan all laid out and some seeds have been ordered. If you are interested in helping her with the seed sorting and ordering tasks, she would be happy for assistance.



Minnesota-Wisconsin Point Long-range Resiliency Planning

MWP-50 Working Group.



The MWP-50 Working Group met Friday, Feb. 23 to discuss and approve the following definition of resilience of Minnesota/Wisconsin Point:

- "A resilient Great Lakes is one in which communities, infrastructure, ecosystems, and the economy can withstand, adapt to, and recover from climate-related stressors and changing conditions to ensure equitable and inclusive social, economic, and environmental well-being across the basin." (Great Lakes Commission, 2022) As part of the resilient Great Lakes, Minnesota/Wisconsin Point is a cohesive community of partners who collaborate to study, monitor, plan for, and implement best practice solutions to ensure the preservation of the entirety of the Point and its assets. This community will facilitate collaborative efforts to preserve these assets through the following actions:
- 1. Organization. A non-profit organization of Minnesota/Wisconsin Point partners is in place starting in 2024 to ensure efforts to continue to protect the Point from damaging conditions is guided by the community it serves. By-laws and a Business Plan define and describe the organizational structure and business plan. The basis for the composition of the stakeholder/partner group is inclusive of individuals and groups who have social, economic, cultural, spiritual, and intellectual ties to the Point.
- 2. Monitoring and Modeling. Key physical metrics such as erosion, flooding, wind, water levels and social metrics, such as policies, development, use, etc. are measured following a prescribed Minnesota/Wisconsin Point Data Plan. Results will be modeled to show current and projected impacts of climate on the Point. This data plan will include a schedule of planned updates. Research needs will be identified and attempts will be made to support research efforts.
- 3. Asset Valuation. Recognizing choices may need to be made with limited resources on which assets to save, establish prioritized determinations of assets to preserve in the land mass and adjoining waters. This determination will be made by an inclusive group of partners in 2024; it will be updated annually.
- 4. Action Plan. A roadmap describing a timeline of short term (1-10 year), mid- term (11-30 year) and long term (31-50 year) actions will be identified for different areas of the Point and nearby waters. Consultations with subject area experts, city planners, scientists, coastal engineers, and others will be used to identify and incorporate best practices into the planning process. Partner input is essential to the process of developing and updating the Action Plan.
- 5. Projects are Implemented. Past and present projects designed to address resilience of the Point will be documented. It is recognized some projects will be undertaken by partners, others by the organization itself. Regardless of who does each project, all attempts will be made to provide full support for projects included in the Action Plan, to track their progress, and to measure their impact.
- 6. Outreach. The Community of Practice will engage partners and the public in a learning community that deepens knowledge of the Point in relation to stewardship practices.

Presidential Primary FAQ

When will the next presidential primary take place? March 5, 2024.

Will all parties participate in the presidential primary? No, only major parties will participate.

Will all parties be on the same ballot? No, each participating major party will have a separate ballot

Who decides which candidates will appear on a party's ballot? The chair of each party will submit a list of candidates for the party's ballot no later than 63 days before the date of the presidential primary (January 2, 2024).

What if a candidate drops out before the primary? Once a party's list is submitted, changes will not be made to candidates that will appear on the ballot.

Will there be a place to write in a choice or vote for "uncommitted"? Only if it is requested by the party chair. Party chairs will need to submit names of write-in candidates to be counted seven days before the primary.

Will any other offices be on the ballot? No, only presidential candidates from a major party will appear on the presidential primary ballot. Other offices with a primary will be on the primary ballot in August.

Who can vote in the presidential primary? Any voter registered in Minnesota.

How will I be able to vote in the presidential primary? A voter must request the ballot of the party of their choice. If a voter refuses to select a party, they will not be able to vote in the presidential primary.

Will other people know which party's ballot I request? A voter's choice of party ballot will be recorded and is private data. However, a list will be provided to the chair of each major political party of voters who selected that party. How a voter voted on the ballot will be secret.

TRAFFIC SAFETY REPORT

Neighbor Mike Satter's outdoor camera picked up a speeding vehicle on a Friday night about 3 weeks ago. The vehicle was clearly exceeding the speed limit by at least 20 mph, probably more. The video with Duluth PD Chief Mike Ceynowa, the Mayor, our city councilor Roz Randorf, and our City Engineering contact James Gittemeier. Chief Ceynowa sent the following message:

I am having staff add this video to our daily bulletin along with an extra patrol request for park point. I will also have our public information officer put out some of our Facebook posts from last summer reminding people of the speed limit, and to be courteous and respectful of the neighborhood when they are driving on the point. I appreciate you letting us know that spring and summer behaviors are already starting up. I am sure Jeremy will be more than willing to attend this meeting.

The Mayor and Councilor Randorf also responded with supporting words for addressing this ongoing issue. We are in process of setting a meeting with James Gittemeier at City Engineering to again address ideas already discussed, with focus on removable speed bumps, Rec/Bike Lane Signage, and removable traffic pylons. We will also ask the Mayor to prioritize this for City Engineering to work with us on solutions.

Update: Speed cameras still not allowed statewide; a pilot program has been launched in Minneapolis but no idea when or if speed cameras will be allowed statewide.
