Neighbor Steve V's Telraam device in the 22 block is telling us that "26,000 cars passed by his house over 2 weeks, and 60% of traffic is going over 30 mph, and over 20% of traffic is going over 43 mph." Two more devices will be collecting data and we will be in touch with DPD on how to get drivers to slow down. Speeds over 30 increase the chances of tragedy and death.

We send a big thank you to everyone who helped with the garden bed repairs, wheel barrow repairs, and helped load old lumber into Dan O'Neill's truck so it could be hauled away. It appears we've completed the structural work in the garden and much of the planting is done. Garden harvesting commenced when the rhubarb ripened in May. Keep in mind that harvesting in the community garden at Lafayette Square is the privilege of working members. We invite everyone to visit our garden, but please don't touch...unless you want to pull a weed or two.

Our May 11 potluck dinner meeting was another spectacular affair. Val Kennedy reports, "Of course the food was delicious! There were many colorful, delicious salads and Ted and Dawn Buck bring the much needed and delicious protein (chicken legs)."

An automated drip system for the raspberry bushes was discussed. Ted Buck and Tom Chrisfield outlined the plans and are moving forward on this project.

Ellie Alspach recounted her eco cruise to South America. She shared beautiful pictures and stories. Ellie says, "It was interesting to wander in a few South American cities to get a sense of how the people lived. In Iquique, Chile, a desert city, it never rains. We saw tsunami signs posted on its streets much like our no parking signs. Lima, we realized, is the second largest city in Latin America - larger than Mexico City. We saw amazing ancient indigenous art in one of its museums. Going through the Panama Canal was informative. I had no idea how many ships were waiting for passage on both sides. We stopped in San Salvador where Columbus first landed in 1492. We were on the "Polaris" ship - the one that parks in the bay in the summer. It was considered an expedition ship since we had a staff of scientists aboard. We kept track of bird and mammal sightings, sent two weather balloons aloft, had art lessons, photography lessons plus daily lectures. We were kept very busy."

From Community Police Officer Jeremy O'Connor

Every year, Grandma's Marathon brings thousands of runners and spectators to Duluth, transforming the city's streets and waterfront into a high-energy race environment. Behind the scenes, DPD and other law enforcement agencies begin planning months in advance to ensure the event runs safely and smoothly. We coordinate with race organizers, city officials, emergency medical teams, and state agencies to map out road closures, crowd control strategies, and emergency response plans. Detailed route assessments help identify potential safety risks, from traffic bottlenecks to areas where large crowds are expected to gather.

On race weekend, preparation shifts into action. Officers are stationed along the entire course—from the starting line outside the city to the finish near Canal Park—to manage traffic, guide spectators, and respond quickly to any issues. Communication is critical, with police using radios and centralized command posts to stay in constant contact throughout the day. In addition to uniformed officers, plainclothes personnel and specialized units may be deployed to monitor for potential security concerns. The goal is to maintain a visible presence that reassures participants while allowing the race to proceed without disruption.

During the marathon itself, police remain adaptable, ready to respond to everything from medical emergencies to lost children or unexpected weather changes. After the final runners cross the finish line, our work continues as we assist with reopening roads and ensuring a safe exit for the crowds. While most spectators focus on the excitement of the race, the careful planning and coordinated effort by law enforcement play a crucial role in making Grandma's Marathon a safe and successful event for everyone involved.

I will be working with K-9 Kallie before and during the race. For those cheering runners on, look for K-9 Kallie and I near the finish line. Afterward the race, I will likely shift to Bayfront Park to monitor the crowd over there for the after-party concert. Good luck to everyone reading this who will be running. I have never run it (besides the Irvin 5K) and use the excuse of working it as a reason not to, but perhaps someday I will get the courage to give it a try.

MP50 Program Committee Report



MP50 continues to be active with partners on multiple projects; six are summarized below.

Manidoo Ishkodeng - The Return of Fire to Minnesota Point. Thanks to the hard work of the Zhaagawaamikong-neyaashi azenamaw manidoo-ishkode partnership, all the pieces are in place for the prescribed burn to be carried out. We have an amazing list of volunteers to help with public communications (thank you!), postcards were sent to all addresses on Park Point, and a list of burn day actions and notifications are at the ready. So far this spring, the weather and wind conditions have not lined up for the burn to take place. The spring window can extend into early June, but once the vegetation gets quite green, the window will close and we will look to the fall. View updates at MP50: [Returning Spirit of Good Fire](#).

Section 111 Study. We have had some progress with the Section 111 Study process. USACE has provided the City with a draft modeling report. Until it is in final status, USACE has asked the City not to distribute the modeling report publicly. This report includes what is called a "sediment budget," which identifies the sources, types and amounts of sediment entering and leaving the system (Minnesota Point). USACE staff came to Duluth to meet with and discuss the report with City staff in person a few weeks ago. The meeting was productive and the City learned some critical information including: 1.) that USACE acknowledges that the Duluth and Superior entries (breakwaters) are blocking 100% of the sediment that, without those structures, would naturally nourish Minnesota Point; and 2.) that the culpability number (percent "responsibility" that USCAE will take for the sediment blockage) is more nuanced than we thought. The City is not accepting the sediment budget as presented by USACE and will be proposing a revised budget (sources and amounts of sediment) to them by the end of May. The hope is that the City and USACE will agree on a sediment budget and move to the next step, which is determining a suitable solution with estimated costs.

Housing Policy. In late 2025, the City of Duluth instituted a one-year moratorium on new vacation rental permits, including those offered through Airbnb and VRBO, so staff can study their impacts on housing availability and community character and develop improvements to the current permitting system. MP50 is continuing to work with the Park Point Community Club to develop input for consideration. Thanks to everyone who was able to share their experiences and ideas through the community survey, which has now closed.

Traffic Safety. Noteworthy updates regarding traffic safety include having 3 Telraam S2 devices (on 8th, 22nd, and 36th streets) up and counting the amount and speed of traffic. The data is public: <https://telraam.net/#13/46.7557/-92.0779>. The Traffic safety committee has a meeting with two city councilors and city engineering and members of MP50 and VSD scheduled in June to discuss improved "No Parking" signage on rec lane and to discuss traffic calming solutions.

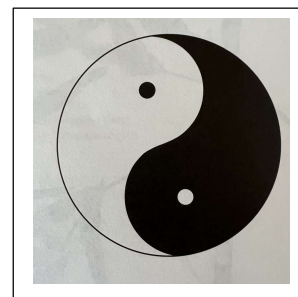
Education Materials. MP50, in partnership with Dovetail Partners, a non-profit organization dedicated to supporting informed environmental decisions, has begun work to create a set of educational materials for Minnesota Point residents, visitors, and the broader public, with a goal of increasing the cultural, recreational, and environmental resilience of the Point. The development of these materials is a key action identified in MP50's 2026 Coastal Resilience Action Plan. Stay tuned for invitations to participate in focus groups and surveys to inform the creation of the materials this summer. Dune Day. Minnesota Point's dunes are a valued and rare coastal system in Minnesota. A new Dune Stewardship Initiative is beginning to take shape to support shared understanding and care for the dunes. With support from Minnesota's Coastal Program at the Department of Natural Resources, early planning is underway for a community Dune Day and a Dune Stewards Program. The tentative date for Dune Day 2026 is September 9th. MP50 is a non-profit organization leading efforts to ensure the ecological, cultural, and economic resilience of Minnesota Point.

Help set up for the Saturday night dinner, serve food to the artists and volunteers, and clean up after the dinner. Help needed from 4-9, shifts available.

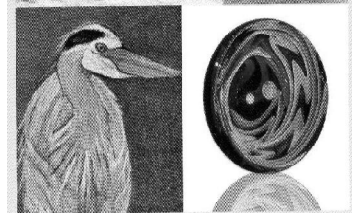
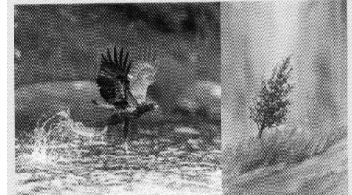
Sunday evening:
