#### **Ship Watching**

Whether you live on the Bay Side or Lake Side, all of us on the Point know that those Great Lakes ships slowly moving on the water make our sandy island a special place for vessel watchers. The powerful engines in those enormous and wonderful ships started back up for the first time after winter layup on March 21st. The American Spirit departed under the Aerial Lift Bridge at approximately 9:00 pm local time, truly starting the shipping season here in Duluth. Those of us on the Bay Side will see many new oceangoing vessels (also known as Salties) arrive this year and dock on the Superior side. Also, those on the Lake Side will see many of those same ships at anchor periodically.

Ship of the Month: The 1,004' American Spirit is known as the fastest 1,000-footer on the Great Lakes, with two diesel engines pushing out approximately 16,000 HP. Built in 1978 as the George A. Stinson, the ship has a 62,400-ton cargo capacity, 7 holds, 36 hatches, 2 rudders, 2 controllable pitch propellers, and is owned by the American Steamship Company.

We may have an opportunity to learn more about cyanobacteria threats at Lake Superior beaches. Christopher T. Filstrup, Ph.D., Applied Limnologist, Director of Central Analytical Lab, Natural Resources Research Institute, reached out to see if Park Pointers might be interested in helping with monitoring and maybe sampling. Chris will be in touch if the project is approved and is willing to come and give a presentation on algal blooms and what they mean and why we need to pay attention, more details later this spring.

Watching the recent swirling snow in the red pines is a beautiful sight, seeing the vitriol on social media regarding a neighbor's real estate dealings is not. We have a lot of work to do on our extraordinary island and no time to get mired in negative exchanges. • 1 bundle each of Juneberry, American Linden, Black Cherry, False Indigo The 94th anniversary of my great grandma Edith's arrival on Park Point is coming up on April 9th. She and her four grown sons rented a tudor style cottage on the beach side and my grandparents then bought the house in 1937. I have always been curious about who built the house. This week I took a close look at the abstract of title from The Consolidated Abstract Co. and it shows Anthony W. Puck & wife Aloysia owning the property and applying for water and gas services in 1907, the year that the house was built. A little internet search revealed that A. Puck was an architect in Duluth. I also found this: One of the nation's leading test pilots, Anthony W. "Tony" LeVier was born "Anthony Puck" in Duluth, Minnesota on February 14, 1913. His father was architect Anthony W. Puck, and his mother, Aloysia Evans was the daughter of a Great Lakes ship engineer. It is perhaps unsurprising then that Tony LeVier found himself drawn to innovation and technology.

When Tony was only 6 years old, his mother moved him and his sister Nancy to California, believing that the warm climate would be beneficial for the family's health. Tony's father was unable to make the trip due to tuberculosis, to which he succumbed shortly after the family had moved. Aloysia later remarried to Oscar LeVier, who gave Tony and Nancy his name.

Puck was the architect for a church, the Pickwick, and other buildings in early Duluth. You never know what you might find out when you start looking.

These activities mark the start of spring cleanup, which is coming early this year because of the temperate weather.

## From the Park Point Community Club By-Laws

XIII. Election of Club Officers and Committee Members The term of office for all officers of the Club and all officers of committees of the Club shall be for two years, and elections shall take place in even numbered years as follows: A. In March of each election year, at the Club's regular March meeting, any member of the Club is eligible to present himself or herself to the membership as a candidate for any office of the Club or its committees.

B. Current officers of the Club and its committees are eligible to run for re election or to run for any other offices of the Club.

C. Other candidates may be selected by a Nominating Committee consisting of three (3) members of the Club, selected by the Club at its regular March meeting. Members of the Nominating Committee shall not be eligible for election to office and shall not hold any office in the Club while serving on the Nominating Committee, the Nominating Committee shall be abolished after the election.

D. The Nominating Committee shall prepare a slate of candidates for each and every office being contested and shall present the slate of candidates to the total membership at the Club's regular meeting in April. At the May meeting, nominations may be made from the floor.

E. At the Club's regular meeting in May, the entire membership shall have the right to vote for all officers of the Club and its committees, but only those present at the May meeting shall actually vote, voice vote or show of hands, as determined by the members present.

F. The candidates who receive the majority of the votes shall be declared elected and shall take office immediately following the election. If no candidate receives a majority on the first ballot, a second vote for that office shall be taken between the top two candidates.

Election of officers will take place at the May PPCC meeting. The current slate of officers: Dawn Buck, President, Tom Griggs, Vice President, Rory Strange, Secretary, and Mary Treuer, Treasurer, are all willing, if not eager, to continue in office. However, if you, or anyone you know, is interested in running for any office, please submit their name for nomination at the April meeting. New blood is always welcome



## Minnesota-Wisconsin Point Long-range Resiliency Planning

## MWP-50 Organization Chart is being implemented

The structure and staffing of the fundraising organization within MWP-50 has been identified. Potential board members are invited to a brainstorming meeting in April to gather input on the organizational structure with an eye towards applying for funds as soon as possible. The goal of fundraising is to staff efforts to educate the public, and identify and implement short, mid, and long term resilience actions for Minnesota/Wisconsin Point.

## USACE Section 111 Study meeting to be held in Duluth April 10

The city of Duluth is hosting a meeting of the USACE Section 111 team to meet with City officials, technical advisors, and MWP-50 representatives from Park Point. The USACE team includes the project lead, chief of engineering and construction, deputy chief of planning, project engineer, project manager, area engineer, and representative from the model contractor. The goal of the meeting is to ensure the entire group is working together with full understanding of timelines, budget, and technical considerations. Interest from the community for transparency of the Section 111 Study will be made explicit.

## The Association of State FloodPlain Managers (ASFPM) Meeting in Duluth May 2 & 3

The AFSPM consulting team for the Minnesota Point Resiliency Study will meet with members of the Duluth Team to share and discuss results of the year-long project. The consultants will tour Minnesota Point and then go over results of their consultations on (1) assessment of the issues, (2) scenario plans and (3) policies that address effects of flooding. The group will discuss possible action plans for the future, funding opportunities, and public presentations of the Minnesota Point AFSPM Study.

**City responds to issues with drifting sand** Jim Filby Williams, Director of City Properties, Parks and Libraries, and Kate Kubiak, City Natural Resources Coordinator, will meet with MWP-50 representatives from Park Point Friday, March 29 to propose a plan to deal with drifting sand between the lift bridge and 12th street on the lake side. As part of the meeting a plan will be developed to gather input from all residents living in the affected area. This proposal is in response to neighbor complaints and site visits.

#### Join our weather team and be a citizen scientist

When I was a young boy, I enrolled in a program called The Royal Canadian Air Cadets. The Air Cadet program is like a military version of the Boy Scouts. One day, I was taking the bus to our weekly meeting. I was proud to be an air cadet and always ensured that my uniform was perfectly pressed and my boots were polished to a blinding shine. On the bus ride to my meeting, I encountered some bullies who ridiculed my uniform and they stepped all over my nicely polished boots. All I could do was swallow my anger and ignore their poor behavior. I learned a lot in air cadets everything from first-aid to field survival — but perhaps the two most influential topics we covered were discipline and citizenship.

At the start of each meeting, we would all line up in formation for inspection. When my commanding officer inspected me, he noticed my scuffed-up boots. I remember his face turning red and I recall him lecturing to me that this was unacceptable. I could have told him what happened on the bus but I did not. I just kept responding "yes, sir." My commanding officer had me fall out, go to the corner and do 50 push-ups. As I got on the ground, I noticed that he, too, got down and did the push-ups with me. I thought this was strange, so later that night I asked one of the senior cadets why he would do that. The senior cadet's response has stuck with me to this day:

"Do not ever ask someone to do something that you yourself are not willing to do!"

My fellow citizens, it is on this note that I ask you to consider becoming a citizen scientist and join the Community Collaborative Rain, Hail and Snow (CoCoRaHS) Network. The network consists of volunteers who measure precipitation in their backyard using a 4-inch rain gauge. The data that we gather is critical for drought monitoring, flood management, and verifying high rainfall totals, to name but a few benefits of the network. The data also go a long way to making our maps more accurate. Further to this, data gathered from our CoCoRaHS volunteers provides guidance on understanding our changing climate. Each year, our State Climate Office asks Minnesotans to join CoCoRaHS. We have always gotten a great response, and last year alone we were able to recruit more than 600 new volunteers. Consider their commitment and let's set an example by showing Minnesotans that we are willing to do what we ask them to do each day! Signing up is easy and all you need is a 4-inch rain gauge. You can sign up for CoCoRaHS on the network's website, and the Official original CoCoRaHS gauge can be purchased from WeatherYourWay.com. If you decide to join, please send me a note and complete the following sentence: "My name is
